Project SEARCH: Upending Unemployment Stats

What if you could turn unemployment statistics for people with developmental disabilities upside down? Hope Services, in partnership with Lucile Packard Children's Hospital at Stanford, Palo Alto Unified School District (PASUD), and San Andreas Regional Center has done just that. In California, the unemployment rate for people with developmental disabilities is 87% (CA Department of Labor). Project SEARCH (PS), a national program, obliterates the statistics and garners employment for 65% of its graduates. The hospital, school district, and regional center partnership has improved those statistics with its inaugural class by placing 88% of graduates within one year of their graduation.

Implemented in August 2012 at Lucile Packard Children's Hospital, PS involves total workplace immersion for young participants and provides a seamless combination of classroom instruction, career exploration, and relevant job-skills training through strategically-designed internships. Upon completion, students with significant developmental disabilities are employed in non-traditional, complex and rewarding jobs.

The program is managed by a PAUSD teacher and Hope Services assists with job coaching, development, and placement. The original class of nine, which graduated in May of 2013, are leaders in helping to bring about an attitude change for hiring people with disabilities and the range of jobs in which they can be successful.

Hope Services will launch its second PS collaboration at Kaiser Permanente's San Jose Medical Center in the summer of 2014 with a focus on adult interns. The educational partner will be Fremont Union High School





District Adult Education, along with San Andreas Regional Center. Response is already skyrocketing: the 2014 class has 17 adult referrals for three openings for the upcoming Kaiser class.

"This is a win-win for everyone involved and I am excited to partner with Kaiser on our next Project SEARCH site. Successful model programs are already underway at multiple Kaiser Permanente Medical Centers across California," said North District Program Manager for Hope Services, Suanne Rinta. "Kaiser is ranked as one of the top employers for persons with disabilities by CAREERS and disABLED magazine."

The Chairman's Message

In the disability world, we celebrate the small steps because, for someone with a disability, the small steps can be life changing. March 24, 2014, marks the implementation of section 503

of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. For some, this new federal ruling could be a life changing step toward new employment. We celebrate these small steps that support the employment of people with disabilities.

Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act will ensure that qualified workers have more meaningful opportunities to find, secure and keep good jobs. For the first time, these rules provide metrics – management tools that inform decision-making and provide real accountability – to measure federal contractors' progress toward achieving equal opportunity for people with disabilities and protected veterans.

The new ruling does this by establishing a new 7% employment goal for people with disabilities. This doesn't just apply to select federal contracts, it applies to every federal contract across the board.

The ruling is particularly important because people with developmental disabilities in the State of California face an 87% unemployment rate despite their interest, ability and willingness to get to work and be meaningful contributors to their communities.

Hope Services is working toward rolling out new programs that will support both our clients and local federal contractors in this regard. As we continue to expand our social enterprise businesses, we are also creating new managed staffing services that will allow federal contractors to meet these new guidelines by placing Hope clients through our service while also benefitting from Hope's expertise in training, job coaching, and ensuring the success of our clients.

When business ramped up for First My Family (FMF), producers of emergency preparedness kits and supplies, CEO and founder Andrew Torres called on Hope to help assemble the survival kits.

Andrew's licensing agreement with AMC TV meant a significant increase in demand and production for The Walking Dead survival kits. (The Walking Dead is the number one-rated show on television and the highest-rated series in the history of cable television).

Andrew was familiar with Hope even before the new contract came about. His uncle had worked at Hope and maintained a job despite a statistical unemployment rate of 87% for people with developmental disabilities in the State of California. Andrew, along with his wife and partner, Angie Torres, knew they had a win-win with a social enterprise project that came full circle for his family.

The military-style messenger bag kit (right) is designed to help two people stay alive for three days and includes water, food, Mylar space blankets, 24-hour body heat blankets, ponchos, glow sticks, a Lifeline first aid kit, procedural medical mask, leather palm work gloves, waterproof matches, and an LED flashlight. Hope applauds the Torres family and their commitment to Hope's success!
