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## The 90's

HOPE Services has always been a leader in the disabilities field. It is often recognized for its innovations that provide opportunities for participants to become active and participating members of their community. The 90's at HOPE Services saw many new initiatives with the launch of HOPE-owned and operated businesses and the Supported Living Program.

In 1990, HOPE Services opened the Kid's Café at the Children's Discovery museum in downtown San Jose. Since its inception, the café has provided food service training and jobs for adults with developmental disabilities, while also providing an alternative revenue stream. Employees of the Kid's Café are trained in all tasks including cashiering, filling food

orders, cooking, verifying deliveries, hosting birthday parties, and preparing catering orders. Employees are also responsible for all set-up, clean-up and janitorial duties necessary to maintain a safe and respected food service business. For many HOPE participants, the Kid's Café has been their first opportunity to earn a pay check.

For the last 22 years, the Kids Café has provided opportunities for HOPE paricipants to receive job training. Many have gone on to become regular employees in the food service industry, while others have gone on to enjoy employment in a variety of other customer service businesses.

HOPE Services was not only implementing new business operations which provided job opportunities for individual with developmental disabilites but the organization was implementing programs that allowed participants to live independently. In 1994, HOPE Services launched its supported living program with the first HOPE client moving into their own apartment in December of that year.

The supported living program provides a range of services and support that allows a client to live independently. HOPE staff assist participants with finding a place to live and daily living activities such as money management, accessing public transportation, medical appointment, and grocery shopping. Although participants live on there own, they are supported by companions and roommates to ensure that the individual is in control of their own living arragement, just like Christa Lawson.

Christa was the first Supported Living participant. Over the past 18 years Christa has developed many friends and community connections. She particularly loves her collection of earrings and handbags and dressing up to go out with her roommate.

Over the years, HOPE Services has supported more than 75 participants in their own living situation. As the 60 Years of HOPE draws to a close, we look forward to sharing with you the "HOPE of Today" in the December edition of HOPE in Action.

## CAN Participants Volunteer at Air for Paws

Participants in the Community Access Network (CAN) program in Gilroy recently spent the day with local firefighters and other community volunteers putting together animal resuscitation kits for Air for Paws. Air for Paws is a local non-profit founded by former HOPE employee, Terry Moriyama, whose mission is to provide fire and rescue personnel with special resuscitation kits and training that can save the lives of family pets. HOPE participants became involved with the organization when CAN Coordinator, Tammy Beltran, reached out to Terry and asked how HOPE could get involved with the organization.





"HOPE Services has always held a special place in my heart," stated Terry. "I was thrilled when Tammy contacted me and asked how the participants could get involved. The energy and excitement that they bring when they volunteer makes for a very successful partnership." CAN participants assembled 75 kits alongside members of the CAL Fire Department. HOPE participants not only completed their volunteer work, but were also able to enjoy the sights and sounds of the engine. "What was an hour worth of work, turned into two hours of fun!" said Terry.

Recently, the Redevelopment Agency who contracts with HOPE Services to provide this valuable service was no longer able to fund the program after being de-funded by State Budget cuts. The Public Works Department of Santa Cruz now contracts with HOPE to provide litter abatement service but there is still a shortage of funds. HOPE Services must raise an additional \$40,000 if we are to keep the members of the Downtown Litter Abatement Crew employed.


